Question Prompts to Support Students' Writing for "Write the Narrative" Challenge Created by Pia, J. (2015)

Print and cut along dotted lines, hole punch each and distribute to students. Students do not have to "answer" the questions; rather, these are to help with memory recall and idea generation.

Exposition
